US News and World Report Rankings

According to the U.S. Department of Education, there are some 7,000 accredited colleges and universities in the United States. Whew! "How can I find the best school for me?" ask bewildered students—and their parents!

College rankings are one way to sort through all the information and come up with a manageable number of schools to investigate more closely. None of the ranking systems is perfect, but the *US News* website and publications offers a wide variety of useful information.

One important caveat—don't fall into the trap of looking at only a few very well-known schools. There are thousands of lesser-known schools that equip their graduates with an excellent education and provide plenty of scholarship and career help too. In the end, students' success in learning and the helpful contacts they make in college will mean far more in their lives than the name on the diploma.

Here in the U.S. we are blessed with one of the strongest collections of top-notch colleges and universities in the world. Taking the time to hunt down the right college for your strengths and interests will pay big dividends in the long run.



Using College Rankings To Find the Perfect School

Thousands of excellent colleges and universities spread across the United States. College rankings can help you find schools that match your strengths as a student, your educational goals, and your sense of self. Use the charts and tables to locate potential schools to check out further through personal visits, websites, and discussion with friends, family, and teachers.



HS Class: Where do you stand in your class ranking? Are you in the top 10%? Top 25%? Top 50%? Check your current report card or request a transcript from the counseling office to find your class rank and grade point average. Colleges are generally more accepting of students with lower GPAs who show a definite uptrend (all As and Bs) during sophomore and junior years. Overall, Ds and low Cs in upper division classes don't show readiness for college.



Once you know your class ranking, check out the "Freshmen in top 25% of HS class" and "Freshmen in top 10%" (on the website). If 90% of the university students are in the top quarter of the high school class, and you're in the lower half, you'll be at quite a disadvantage in courses where the majority of students study more efficiently and score higher on tests than you do.

SAT Percentile: This range shows you the middle 50% of students; 25% of freshmen will have higher scores and 25% will have lower scores. UCLA has middle SAT scores of 1170-1410. A student scoring 1350 on the SAT can feel comfortable that he or she reads, writes, and reasons at levels comparable with most of the students in class, but a student scoring 1120 may struggle to take notes, research, understand, and learn at the same rate as classmates.

HS Counselor Score: This score (available on the website) shows how highly HS counselors rate the school, and they're people who know a good bit about colleges and universities. Some lesser-known schools may suffer.

Class Size: These numbers help you understand how many large lecture hall classes you'll be in and how many smaller classes with 10-20 members you can expect. In general, private universities and liberal arts colleges have the smallest classes with the most attention from full-time Ph.D. professors. Public (state) universities hold down their costs with larger classes and a good many graduate student teaching assistants.

Campus Life: Lots of solid information on the website, including student comments.

Tuition and Fees: Stop! Don't have a heart attack over private school fees. That's what school endowments are for, and most private colleges are extremely generous with their financial aid. Here's the info on Occidental College: Tuition & Fees: \$40,903; Students granted financial aid: 59%; Financial aid package: \$33,612; Average need-based scholarships & grants: \$28,046. Wow! That's CHEAPER than a state school. If you're a good student and your parents are not wealthy, you may find a top liberal arts college the LEAST expensive way to go
